

# New officials attend capacity building activities on Gender and Development



Capacity building activities on Gender and Development orientation and gender analysis was conducted by the Benguet State University – Gender and Development (BSU-GAD) Unit on January 15, 22 and February 10, 2021. This was participated by the Gender and Development Focal Point System (GFPS) composed of the BSU Administrative Council members and the GAD Technical Working Group (TWG), including the program/project developers and implementers.

The activities were conducted to capacitate the newly designated officials and to comply on the submission of FY 2022 Budget.

The first activity was the orientation seminar on CHED Memorandum Order No. 1, series of 2015 Entitled "Establishing the Policies and Guidelines on Gender and Development (GAD) in the Commission on Higher Education Institutions (HEIs), Gender Mainstreaming and GAD Plan and Budget: An Overview."

This aimed to provide comprehensive overview to BSU Officials regarding said topics. The seminar was conducted on January 15 and 22, at the Everlasting Hall, New R and E Building. The resource speaker was NEDA Regional Director Dr. Milagros A. Rimando who emphasized that everybody should be GAD advocates because gender issues affect all of us.

The second activity was on Gender Analysis with the use of Harmonized Gender and Development Guidelines (HGDG) as a tool for GAD mainstreaming in the University. This aimed to demonstrate the utilization of the HGDG tool in project identification, design, implementation and monitoring and evaluation; analyze gender issues in the whole project development and implementation cycle; and assess the gender responsiveness of these projects. This training was conducted on February 10, 2021 at the CTE Function Hall. The resource person, a member of the Philippine Commission on Women Resource Pool, Dr. Ferdinand P. Gonzales, highlighted that the HGDG tool should be used to analyze the entire

Dr. Dumapis expressed gratitude to the support given to the examinees by BSU and its President, Felipe Salaing Comila such as the BSU coaster used to ferry the examinees to and from the examination venue. He also talked about the program Binadang Licensure Examination Extension Service for Students (BLESS).

We also prepared their examination kits," said Dr. Dumapis. He added that although the passing rate of the college has gone down due to retakers, the college is still optimistic of continuing the program.

The first time takers of the examination listed a 44.19% passing rate and the repeaters listed 10% making the general BSU passing rate 37.74% a few points away from the national passing rate of 41.95% //JSTabangcura

# **Balik-Scientist lectures on Precision Agriculture**

DOST-PCAARRD Balik-Scientist Prof. Guillermo Mendoza was the lecturer for the webinar on Precision Agriculture (PA) last February 18, 2021. The webinar aimed to introduce PA and its concepts to the researchers, faculty, and students of BSU and other universities in the country. Further, it aimed to emphasize the application of Geographic Information System (GIS) on PA. The activity was conducted via Zoom. A total of 73 participants joined. The BSU PA team gathered at the Carnation Hall, R&E Building to attend the webinar.

Prof. Guillermo Mendoza is a professor emeritus of the Natural Resources

and Environmental Sciences at the University of Illinois, USA.

With Prof. Mendoza's expertise in GIS, he shared on the concepts and principles of precision agriculture. He defined Precision Agriculture as Digital Agriculture. He explained that it is a new method of agriculture that manages crop production inputs such as water, seed, and fertilizer using Artificial Intelligence (AI) like Global Positioning Systems (GPS), GIS, sensors and application control. Prof. Mendoza highlighted that PA not only is economical but also environmental-friendly as it reduces chemicals released into the

environment. He emphasized that Precision Agriculture offers excellent opportunities to improve productivity in farming and it would be a good investment for the Philippines. The webinar concluded with a question and answer forum.

After the webinar, the BSU PA team lead by Dr. Janet Pablo for the Magic 7+ Consortium conducted a consultation workshop with Prof. Mendoza. Dr. Pablo introduced the Magic 7+, a Philippine-Canadian educational consortium collaborating on the fields of agriculture, food security and indigenous education. Prof. Mendoza was tapped to help BSU in developing a well-packaged proposal for Precision Agriculture. It was discussed that the proposal be improved upon the arrival of Prof. Mendoza in the university which was scheduled in March 2021.

Despite the pandemic, BSU continues its engagement with Prof. Mendoza. This is the second activity with the Webinar on Forestry Researches and Community-based Policies conducted on November 21, 2020 being the first. The said webinars were hosted by the Center for Geoinformatics in partnership with the International Relations Office (IRO), College of Agriculture (CA) and College of Forestry (CF). //GBPalberas



# PATHWAY project partners present state of Filipino entrepreneurship and employability culture



"Many people come out of universities with lots of expectations, lots of skills and education but it's very difficult for them to hit the job market and to find the things they want to do. There's also a lot of expectations from young people nowadays on what they want to do with their lives, so I think we have to match all these, the skill sets in universities, the needs and expectations of young people and the needs and expectations of the job market."

This was according to Christoph Wagner, head of Cooperations Section, EU Delegation to the Philippines during the virtual launch event of the PATHWAY project on February 23-25, 2021. PATHWAY stands for Promoting the employ Ability and enTrepreneurship of Higher education graduates through innovative WAYs in the Philippines. A three-year long project involves Philippine and European Union universities including Benguet State University, students, employers and industry sector, and policy makers.

The said launch event revealed the state of entrepreneurship and employability culture for Filipino graduates. PATHWAY Project Manager Christina Beans presented the challenges Filipinos face in terms of employability and employment, entrepreneurship, and structural institutional issues.

Beans cited figures from the International Labour Organization to show the challenges confronting Filipino graduates as follows: unemployment and underemployment are a significant problem for young people in the Philippines (25,7% of aged 15-25 are unemployed); young people are four times as likely to be unemployed as the adult population, a figure which worsens in the case of women; on average it takes a college graduate on average two years to find a fixed job; limited employment opportunities force Filipinos to migrate by necessity; and ~65% of HE graduates do not have the right skills or training to quality for the jobs they are applying for, indicating a great mismatch between university training and industry needs.

And while around 700,000 students graduate each year, Antonio Peralta of the European Chamber of Commerce of the Philippines (ECCP), speaking from the business perspective said that organizations are struggling to recruit because of the increasing demand for new and emerging skills, high turnover rate among the working population, candidates are receiving multiple job offers, lack of work experience among the pool

of job applicants and recruitment data analysis. There are also the compounding challenges due to COVID-19 such as the transition from human to virtual engagement, increased recruitment costs and government regulations.

"Why do organizations prefer hiring candidates with experience? Basically because of the lower onboarding and training costs, it improves retention and there's an existing network of professions. However companies are also starting to pay more attention to other factors and that is employee attitude and the intellectual curiosity that is seen with new candidates," added Peralta.

In terms of entrepreneurship, Beans presented that although a formal program for entrepreneurship education was introduced by CHED in 2005, the curriculum concentrates on training students to create start-ups, but doesn't target the growth and long-lasting opportunity sectors. She added that there is no budget allocated to set up business generators or incubators, there are no links with non-academic organisations, there are difficulties of finding capital to open a business and only 1% of students effectively engage in launching a business after graduation.

The project aims to address these challenges by fostering and boosting university-enterprise synergies, and by accompanying CHED's reforms on building up an entrepreneurship culture at a national level. In the next three years, PATHWAY will conduct staff training workshops, student workshops, business events, hackathons, and a national conference. Details about these events will be available at the project Facebook page, @Pathway2employability.

PATHWAY is coordinated by the University of Alicante (Spain) and brings together five universities from the Philippines (Ateneo de Manila University, Benguet State University, Lyceum of the Philippines University, Polytechnic University of the Philippines, St. Paul University Philippines), as well as CHED, ECCP, Enactus Philippines and the University of Montpellier (France). //JSTabangcura
