De Vera inaugurates CHED-**Funded projects at BSU**


Commissioner J. Prospero "Popoy" E. De Vera III of the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and CHED-CAR Regional Director Demetrio P. Anduyan Jr. were in the University on April 21, 2024 to inaugurate the CHED-funded smart library facilities and engineering laboratories. The commissioner also planted a tree at the lawn near the BSU administration building.

The projects inaugurated are the "Smart Library Facilities for BSU Campuses (La Trinidad, Buguias, Bokod)" lodged at the BSU La Trinidad Library and the "Enhancement of Engineering and Technology Laboratories of Benguet State University" lodged at the College of Engineering (CE). The library project received a funding of PHP 7,500,000.00 while the engineering laboratory project received PhP 25,000,000.00. Both funds are under the Higher Educational Development Fund through the Institutional Development and Innovation Grant (IDIG) Program.

The IDIG Program assists higher education institutions in upgrading its instructional and learning facilities to ensure delivery of quality education to all students and produce locally-responsive, innovative, and globally competitive graduates and lifelong learners especially in the era of digital transformation.

"I am very happy to be here and I am very happy to see that CHED projects have already been implemented. Since I became Chair, we have been increasingly giving projects to State Universities and Colleges to improve their facilities to make sure the needs of the students are met," said De Vera.

De Vera was welcomed by the faculty and staff of the CE and the University Library and Information Services (ULIS) led by BSU President Felipe Salaing Comila.//JSTabangcura

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BSU faculty researchers attend research ethics training workshop

To better equip the university faculty researchers on the practice and understanding of research ethics, the BSU Research and Extension Sector held a two-day training and workshop on Research Ethics on April 18-19, 2024.

On the first day, five of the invited speakers simultaneously delivered their presentations. Cordillera Regional Health Research and Development Consortium (CRHDC) member Eleanor D. Cuarte presented a walk-through on the history of research ethics. This includes the inhumane conduct of experiments and research on humans during the war and the evolution of policies, laws, and guidelines that resulted from these.

This was followed by Marina I. Sagandoy, another member of CRHRDC who gave an overview of the general elements of research ethics which are social values, justice, and transparency among others. During the open forum, the issues of moral dilemmas in different contexts of conducting research were also deliberated.

CRDRDC member Pelin P. Belino then talked about the responsibility of the research adviser, researchers, and the institution as part of ensuring the quality of research works. In line with this, BSU Research Ethics Committee Chair (BSU-REC) Florence V. Poltic gave an overview of the university's standard operating procedures, guidelines for conducting research, and the ethics review process among others.

Finally, BSU-REC Co-Chair Ruth S.
Batani discussed the ethical guidelines for social research; research involving indigenous peoples; and herbal research & environmental health research.
Throughout her presentation, the question of whether controversial issues should be studied was rounded. According to her,

no scientific inquiry should be suppressed but it must be sensitive to the scientific, ethical, and political implications. On the last day, College of Nursing (CN) Faculty Member Jude L. Tayaben specified the ethical guidelines for both research in traditional and alternative health care and on health policy and systems research. Following this, College of Social Science (CSS) Faculty Member Agnes Kryza H. Sito also talked about the ethical guidelines for research in mental health and those involving minors or children.

The final presentation on the ethical guidelines for collaborative research, authorship, and publication was then given by the Research and Extension Publication Office (REPO) Director Cheryll C. Launio.

The VP for Research and Extension Roscinto Ian C. Lumbres shared his enthusiasm for the organized activity and challenged the university researchers to put into practice all the presentations and discourses.

To end the training workshop, the Office of Extension Services (OES) Director Anna Cris L. Langaoan closed the activity with a commendation saying, "This is a testament to our commitment to continuous self-improvement...at some point, we might have found ourselves in moments of discomfort. So, for those who have found themselves in moments of discomfort, that is a good sign. Meaning we are still capable of recognizing that there are shortcomings we have along the way in the conduct of research."// CANapiloy

AACCUP evaluates BSU degree programs

The Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines, Inc (AACCUP) evaluated the four degree programs of BSU during the online Preliminary Survey Visit (PSV) on April 22-26, 2024.

The event intended to determine the readiness of the programs for the formal visits by the AACCUP. The programs assessed were the BA in Communication, BA in English Language, BA in Filipino Language, and the BA in Exercise and Sports Science.

The AACCUP accreditation team was led by Ricky G. Abaleña III of the West Visayas State University, as the overall coordinator, together with Jermine F. Alinea of the Southern Luzon State University, Lanie B. Tiu of the Ilocos Sur Polytechnic State College, and Anthony J. Antonio of the Bulacan State University.

The week-long survey visit focused on the evaluation of documents under the areas of Vision, Mission, Goals and Objectives; Faculty; Curriculum and Instruction; Support to Students; Research; Extension and Community Involvement; Library; Physical Plant and facilities; Laboratories; and Administration. It also included online ocular visits to the facilities of the University.

The event was concluded with the closing meeting on April 26 where the accreditors presented their findings about the strengths and recommendations to the programs evaluated.

Abaleña commended the BSU local task force and the management for their passion, commitment, and receptiveness that led to the successful accreditation process. He also encouraged the BSU team to continue working towards quality programs and excellent education.

"I encourage you communicate with us even beyond this accreditation. We can collaborate and become each other's helping hand in the years to come towards Philippine quality education," he said.

VP for Academic Affairs, Samuel S. Poliden in behalf of the University President, expressed gratitude and commitment that the University will continuously enhance the quality of its degree programs and services towards quality education.// EBawayan

CTE Faculty Members serve as Guest Lecturers at Indonesian University



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6th ThinkTalk features communication and negotiation in diverse contexts

As part of the ThinkTalk: Language, Literature, Arts and Communication Series, the Benguet State University-College of Arts and Humanities (CAH) in collaboration with the Institute of Social Research and Development (ISRD) held its sixth webinar with the theme "The Role of Communication and Negotiation in Diverse Contexts" on April 12, 2024.

Four seasoned researchers presented their research results gleaned from their studies encompassing media and information literacy, finding your identity in a multicultural space, indigenous healing as a communicative phenomenon, and the representation of *Kankanaey* women in local films.

In her opening remarks, College of Arts and Humanities Dean Myrna B. Sison-Kuiper expressed, "In an era where the landscape of communication is as dynamic as it is challenging, our coming together today is more than just a conference. It is a commitment to excellence and understanding in the disciplines that will shape human progress."

Moreover, VP for Research and Extension Roscinto Ian C. Lumbres encouraged the research community of the university to work together as "the name of the game right now is no longer competition, but collaboration."

In the morning session, Janet S. Tibaldo of the School of Teacher Education and Liberal Arts, Saint Louis University talked about the crucial role of being a media and information literate amidst information overload.

According to her, most Filipinos are over-entertained but under-informed. Thus, understanding the context and the underlying messages of information is necessary to combat the spread of fake news and false advertisements. This can be achieved by the use of the mnemonics AFTOM which refers to author, format, target

audience, objective, and manage.
Additionally, Communications and Change
Management Lead Gretchen Shagami C.
Mangahas of the Toronto Catholic District
School Board in Toronto Canada shared her
lived experience as an immigrant in a foreign
and individualistic society.

With this, she also presented in detail the challenges encountered by Filipino immigrants in maintaining their identity while practicing cultural adaptation in an unfamiliar space.

During the afternoon portion, two faculty researchers from the university also presented their findings. Christine Grace S. Fuchigami of the Department of Development Communication, College of Information Sciences shed light on the place of indigenous healing in our contemporary times where biomedicine is more widely recognized by today's generation.

In her research, Fuchigami argued that indigenous healing still proves effective and easily accessible to the indigenous communities. Further, it is still rooted as part of their indigenous identity and should thus be integrated into the practice of biomedicine.

Lastly, College of Arts and Humanities-Department-of Arts and Communication Faculty and Chair Peter P. Dalocdoc Jr. expounded his study on the representation of *Kankanaey* women in indigenous films.

His study revealed the changing landscape of women's roles within the household and the community as a whole as compared to the convention of tradition. This includes the recognized ability of women to lead among others. On the other side of this progress, however, representation of women as victims and expectations of motherhood remains unchanged.

Platforms for questions, clarifications, and discussion were also entertained in between presentations. To close, CAH faculty member

Lory Rose Supsupin delivered the activity's synthesis followed by a closing remark from the Director of the Institute of Social Research (ISRD) and Development, Ann Heather B. Kiwang. Commending the concluded event, she highlighted the close correlation between communication and language to social science and resounded the spirit of collaboration among researchers.

She further announced to keep updated on future events and activities that will transpire in the future. //CANapiloy

The paper "Development of Ready-to-eat Dehydrated Chayote (Sechume edule): Nutritive Value, Profitability, Consumer Buying Behavior, and Shelf-life" by Lesley Dale G. Umayat, Jeftee Ben B. Pinos-an, and Zinnia B. Dasilen was adjudged Best Paper during the 4th International Research Summit by the Philippine Association of Collegiate Schools of Business held on April 18, 2024 in Tagbilaran, Bohol.
