UN, PMCP, CSSP and FCCP cites BSU researchers and filmmakers

The Benguet State University entry to the International Forest Short Film Festival was selected by an international jury as one of the 21 finalists. The BSU entry with the title, "The Mother Forest" produced by a three-man team (Jumar B. Yago-an, Ma. Luz D. Fang-asan and this writer) was selected from among 127 entries across 38 countries. The film festival is organized by the United Nations Forum on Forests in partnership with the Jackson Hole Wildlife Film Festival. According to the UN Forum on Forests website, the film festival is to honor the creative efforts of film makers who visually capture how forests inspire, shelter, nurture and contribute to people's lives. The five winning film makers will be honored in person during the tenth session of the Forum on Forests (UNFF10) in Istanbul on Wednesday, 10 April 2013.

The Pest Management Council of the Philippines, Inc. honored three members of the BSU College of Agriculture faculty. Asuncion L. Nagpala received the Pest Management Award in Instruction in recognition of her outstanding contribution and relevant innovations in teaching plant pathology. Nagpala received the award on March 8, 2013 during PMCP's 44th Annual Scientific Conference at Hotel Centro, Puerto Princesa, Palawan.

The research poster, "Evaluation and Selection of Potato Genotypes Under Organic Production Systems in Low Mountain Zone of Benguet, Philippines" by BSU researchers Belinda A. Tad-awan, Jocelyn C. Perez, Darwin A. Basquial and Josie C. Pagtahak sa Tuwid na Daan is in consonance with President Beniano Aquino's pursuit and vision of 'tuwid na daan'. The theme underscores women's leadership role and participation in governance to enhance gender perspective in upholding good governance. It highlights the importance of strengthening the mechanisms and institutions that support women and to widen the arena for their participation.

It is also aligned with Section 11 (Participation and Representation) and Section 29 (Peace and Development) of the Magna Carta of Women (RA 9710).

The world observes the International Women's Day (IWD) every March 8 as a result of the organizing activities of women in the early 20th Century. Between 1909 and 1911, working women in the United States participated in organizing strike activities of the National Women's Trade Union League and other concerned groups. They were responding to the low wages, lack of protective legislation and the poor working conditions to which

Shamag BSU – MAG pioneering in making a difference to the children of OFW in the Elementary of Benguet

Thirty-nine MA Guidance and Counseling Students of Benguet State University enrolled in the subject Group Process (GC 214) conducted a series of outreach services from February 15 to March 1, 2013. The outreach services were done in three succeeding Fridays (February 15 and 22 and March 1, 2013) at the Benguet Ucab Elementary School in Itogon and at Puguis Elementary School in La Trinidad. Close to 90 pupils received psychosocial intervention initiatives as part of the pioneering program managed by Prof. Wilfredo Mina in coordination with DepEd Benguet Division and the Philippine Red Cross Benguet Chapter. The GC 214 students are counselors at secondary and elementary schools, pastors, social workers, mothers, and parents who would like to share their expertise in relieving and handling the effect of parents working overseas. This is especially among elementary kids entrusted to grandparents

or relatives.

An intervention program "Pamilya mo, Lingap ko" was developed targeting the effects of absentee parents based on the survey results as follows: failing grades, easily influenced by peers, lack of discipline, unattended psychological and emotional needs, and lack of interest in schooling, the most common among the participants.

In the three succeeding Friday sessions, students were coached to develop means of expressing ones feeling thru arts and identifying the significant people who are present during their parents' absences. Group and individual counseling sessions were also used to further understand the situation of students. These

techniques in dealing with the kids of expatparents are therapies which posit that people benefit from shared experiences.

"Walk the walk and talk the talk" is one cliché that should be observed since this practice is both backed up with theories and skills. The program is a heartfelt effort of the people who worked and facilitated for it. It involved the collective effort of planning and coordination with partner agencies. The underlying principle is to partner with NGOs in institutionalizing programs that will cater to the socio-psychological needs of the children of migrant workers. Aimed at providing welfare services to the families of OFWs, the program focuses on children through responsive and sustainable program and systems fully coordinated with all concerned local, national, and foreign agencies/institution.

This pioneering endeavor is a result of the visit of Prof. Mina to our kababayan based in Hong Kong in coordination with the Red Cross Benguet Chapter under the "Pamilya mo, Lingap

State universities to support farm mechanization program

Mar 10, 2013 (Menafn - The Manila Times - McClatchy-Tribune Information Services via COMTEX) -- The Department of Agriculture (DA) has partnered with 11 state universities and colleges (SUC) for the dissemination of postharvest equipment and mechanization technologies, as well as educate farmers down to the grassroots level.

Rex Bingabing,
DA-Philippine Center for
Postharvest Development
and Mechanization (PhilMech)
executive director, said
that the partnership would
help in the dissemination of
various farm technologies
and knowledge to farmers,
citing that many SUCs have
their own extension offices
and even do research and
development related to
agriculture.

The 11 SCUs include the Central Luzon State University (CLSU), Benguet State

University, Nueva Vizcaya
State University, Pampanga
Agriculture College, Camarines
Norte State College, Bicol
University, Bataan Peninsula
State University, Aklan State
University, Central Mindanao
University, Misamis Oriental
State College of Agriculture,
and Technology, University of
Southeastern Philippines.

"SUCs also have capable field extension personnel who can be trained to educate farmers on postharvest and mechanization. Eventually, what PhilMech wants to do is reach out to more farmers and commercialize and disperse mature technologies on postharvest and mechanization," he said.

PhilMech's agreement with the SUCs requires developing and enhancing capabilities of a cadre of experts in postharvest and mechanization at the

educational institutions; establishment of technology demonstration centers, postharvest and mechanization section at each of the SUC extension service office; and provision of farm and business advisory services to farmers groups, entrepreneurs, processors, traders, millers and other interested stakeholders.

Bingabing said that besides providing education in their respective jurisdictions, SUCs are also mandated to undertake research and development activities in collaboration with various government agencies, and do extension work to help create livelihood down to the grassroots level.

"The extension work usually involves the dispersion of farming technologies, development of State Universities... page 8

women workers were subjected during that time.

The demonstrations were an offshoot of the tragic March 25 Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire in New York City, which took the lives of more than 140 working girls, mostly Italian and Jewish immigrants. Subsequently, the inhumane working conditions and other unfair labor practices leading up to the disaster were invoked during observances of IWD.

In Europe, Clara Zetkin and the Socialist Women's International demanded that March 8th be the International Women's Day (IWD), celebrated each year to recognize working women around the world. The celebration of IWD has since stimulated major historical events. For instance, IWD was the inspiration for the general strike which began the Russian Revolution in St. Petersburg in 1917 when 10, 000 women textile workers demonstrated.

It is due to such history of women organizing around the world that IWD was officially recognized by the United Nations to celebrate women's contributions to all societies.

In the Philippines, the 2013 Women's Month/Day Celebration is pursuant to: Proclamation No. 224 s. 1988 declaring the first week of March each year as Women's Week and March 8 as Women's Rights and International Peace Day; Proclamation No. 227 s. 1988 providing for the observance of the Month of March as Women's Role in History Month; and Republic Act (RA) 6949 s. 1990 declaring March 8 of every year as National Women's Day.

The obejectives of this year's celebration were: to highlight women's leadership roles, participation in-decision making, and participation in the political arena, peacebuilding and conflict resolution; to build upon the gains achieved under existing mechanisms and institutions that support women and gender-responsive governance; and to strengthen partnership with media in promoting women's rights and in advocating to address gender issues.//

entrepreneurial skills, and training programs," he said, adding that there are also various SUCs that host research centers exclusively devoted to a certain agriculture commodity.

PhilMech's partnership with the 11 SUCs was an offshoot of a recently concluded seminar workshop on information, technology and training needs assessment on postharvest and mechanization that was held at the PhilMech

headquarters at CLSU Compound, Science City of Munoz, NuevaEcija. The seminar was attended by representatives and officials of various SUCs.

Bingabing said that the SUCs will also gain from its partnership with PhilMech since the personnel from the state educational institutions will learn more about farm postharvest and mechanization from the agency.

"It is also very important that students taking up agriculture in SUCs appreciate and learn more about the importance of mechanization and postharvest in modernizing the Philippine agriculture sector," he said.
