Coffee farming systems seen as means to alleviate poverty in Bakun and Kibungan




Coffee farming supplies worth PhP 79,390.00 were turned over to the Sagpat Farmers Association on September 4, 2013 for the CHED funded research project Coffee-based Farming Systems for Poverty Alleviation in the Municipalities of Bakun and Kibungan, Benguet Province, Cordillera Administrative Region. This benefit was received by Arnold C. Ampal, president of the Sagpat Farmers Association, one of the project beneficiaries.

The University has turned over PhP 79,390.00 worth of coffee farming supplies to the Sagpat Farmers Association on September 4, 2013.

This intervention is through the research, "Coffee-based Farming Systems for Poverty Alleviation in the Municipalities of Bakun and Kibungan, Benguet Province, Cordillera Administrative Region" funded by CHED.

The research is a development intervention that

hopes to provide positive changes in the living standards of people in Bakun and Kibungan. These two Benguet municipalities are classified as 4th class municipalities and were identified by the research project as areas that could be developed to become economically self-sufficient. Both municipalities are generally agriculture areas with semi-temperate climate conducive to grow Arabica coffee, semi-temperate vegetables, and rootcrops.

College Of Nursing Toughens Research and Extension Services

In its charge for the sustenance of research and extension services, last September 10, 2013, the College of Nursing in partnership with the Philippine Nursing Research Society Inc. (PNRSI)-Benguet State University-Research Cell conducted a seminar write shop on "Writing Academic Research Article" at the Crysanthemum Hall with Dr. Erlinda Castro-Palaganas as the resource speaker.

The seminar, participated in by nurse researchers from different nursing schools in and outside La Trinidad aimed to serve as a vehicle for the participants to learn how to write an academic research article from their graduate and individual researches, be encouraged to prepare their own studies for publication and appreciate research itself.

The 17 participants were from the Cordillera Career Development College, Easter College, Lorma Colleges, University of the Cordilleras, host Benguet State University-College of Nursing and Don Mariano Marcos Memorial State University in Agoo La Union as the farthest.

Dr. Erlinda C. Palaganas, the national president of the Philippine Nursing Research Society, Inc. focused her lecture on the elements of a research article, rules in research article construction, the IMRAD as an approach to research, how to publish a research and the reasons why researchers must publish their academic articles. The various journals where nurses can publish their articles including the Philippine Journal of Nursing where Dr. Palaganas is also the editor-in-chief was as well included in the lecture.

During the afternoon session, the write shop was conducted with the participants grouped according to their institution. Dr. Palaganas then provided suggestions and comments to the presented articles after.

As an evaluation to the seminar-write shop, a participant commented that the activity was exceptional because they were updated on the trends

Researchers and policy makers gather in suicide prevention day forum

As memorable as the 9/11 twin towers tragedy in New York, USA, the world also remembers 9/10 or September 10 of every year as Suicide Prevention Day. This was declared and made commemorated by the World Health Organization (WHO) in 2003.

In Benguet, Suicide а Prevention Forum was organized by the BSU-Institute of Social Research and Development, BSU-Office of Student Services, ResearchMate Inc., and the Cordillera Regional Health Research and Development Consortium (CRHRDC) on September 10, 2013 at the BSU Gladiola Center. The forum aimed to foster understanding of the suicide phenomenon as well as to initially plan extension activities that can be delivered to specific communities.

The papers presented in the forum are: Pansig'dan-Understanding Suicide in the Context of Cash Crop Farming by Ruth Sidchogan-Batani, Stanley F. Anongos Jr., Mursha D. Gapasin, Rachelle D. De Guzman, Betty C. Listino, Beverly C. Sa-ao, Tecah C. Sagandoy and Gregorio C. Taag; Predictors and Severity of Suicidal Ideation among BSU College Students by Ramon Fiangaan; Profile of Suicide in the Mountain Trail Areas by Phoebe U. Pasiwen; Biomedical Perspective (Community Based) by Joseph Alunes; and Life Skills and Interventions for Suicide Prevention by Maricris Lad-ey.

Collectively the papers presented suicide figures in Benguet. They presented the factors that lead to suicide, the means, the socio-demographic data of the suicide victims and recommended interventions.

In her study, Pasiwen said that suicide is a public health concern; yet, because it is culturally a taboo to openly discuss suicide among most people of Benguet, suicide has become a silent epidemic haunting

the province as early as 1961.

Pasiwen's study indicated that the actual suicide rate of three identified municipalities in Benguet, which is 35.17 per 100,000-population in the span of 11 years, exceeds the global annual mortality rate of 14.5 per 100,000 population as recorded by WHO.

The study Pansig'dan tried to bring light to the factors that caused such a high number of people who decided to end their own lives. Results of the study show that accessibility and availability of 'means of suicide' like pesticides have facilitated self-inflicted injuries. Likewise, the effects of family history, suicide clustering, and peer pressure can be very serious.

All the studies have a common finding: there is no single factor that could predict suicide; there are always two or more factors at interplay.

"Although all suicides started as suicidal ideation, not all suicidal ideation leads to suicide," says Fiangaan. He added that suicide ideation could either lead to the act

or it could lead to a healthy fear of death to which he recommended that available professionals and community leaders should be trained in suicide crisis management.

The forum was attended by students, community members, leaders and policy makers. //JST

BSU conducts forum on Appropriate Pesticide Handling and Application

Benguet State University has conducted a forum on the Appropriate Pesticide Handling and Application on September 24, 2013. This is to discuss with farmer-cooperators the current practice of producing and bringing their products still laden with pesticides to the markets.

The Office of the Extension Services (OES) through its training and outreach section initiated the activity in response to the report of the Bureau of Plant Industry showing that some vegetables and strawberries being sold in the markets had been detected with pesticide residues, said Dr. Silvestre Kudan, OES Director. Reports show that the common pesticide residues found in

the vegetable and strawberry samples gathered were organochlorines, pyrethroids, and organophosphates.

Dr. Constantino Sudaypan, training and outreach division head of the OES, bared that based on claims of experts and those cited in literatures, these pesticides affect the nervous system and may cause various kinds of diseases when ingested.

He added that the activity was conducted to re-orient the participants on the ill-effects of extensive pesticide use and gain the commitment of the farmers on responsible usage or even non-utilization of pesticides.

Aside from the proper use and handling of pesticides,

the participants were presented the overview of the pesticide residues analysis conducted by BPI on selected crops. They were also informed on the practical ways to use organic fertilizers which is in-line with the advocacy of BSU to promote and practice organic agriculture.

Incidentally, the activity is also a prerequisite for the renewal of contracts between the farmer-cooperators and the University based on the memorandum issued by the VP for Business Affairs, Dr. Jones Feleciano.

Meantime, Dr. Kudan informed farmer-partners that the vegetable and strawberry produce of the organic grower-cooperators of the University also were analyzed and based
