ISRD, CAS advocate International Day of the World's Indigenous People through a Webinar

The Institute of Social Research and Development (ISRD) led by its Director, Dr. Gigy G. Banes and the College of Arts and Sciences- Social Science Department held a webinar titled, "International Webinar on Indigenous Knowledge Systems and Wellbeing" on August 23, 2021. The webinar is in celebration of the International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples. This was in partnership with the *Foro Internacional De Mu Jeres Indigenas* and *Hapiyoh Mi Culture and Arts*.

There were six resource speakers who delivered their presentations through Zoom. There were participants who attended face-to-face at the Everlasting Hall of the Research and Extension Building while others attended via Zoom and Facebook Live.

Ms. Grancine M.S.N. Naputi, the Program Manager of Guam State Clearing House, Office of the Lieutenant Governor of Guam, was the first speaker. Her presentation was titled, "Decolonizing Sexuality: Chamoru Epistemology of Liberatory Praxis." She discussed that sexuality is not something to be afraid of nor should it be considered as taboo. She eventually related it to sexual reproductive health which needs a positive and respectful approach to sexuality and culture. She shared that sex education was not part of the curriculum in Guam, leading to

different sexual behaviors.

According to Ms. Naputi, the integration of sex education into the curriculum should be culture-based to counter the existing foreign sexual script. She emphasized that sex education must be contextualized and not imposed by colonizers.

The second speaker was Mr. Roland Ngalob from Besao National High School, Mountain Province. He talked about "*Inayan*: Its Social Meaning and Transformations in Changing Socio-Cultural Context of Agawa, Besao, Mountain Province." He said *Inayan* forbids evil deeds and explained that it encompasses areas of the unseen, nature, resource management and people. Mr. Ngalob further discussed that *Inayan* is used as an authoritative

guide, a warning or signal, a call to obey, and a description of good social actions. He elaborated the contributory factors to the changing views on *Inayan* caused by education, religion, migration, and economics. Mr. Ngalob concluded that the Agawa community used *Inayan* as environmental protection against development projects to preserve their traditions and cultural identity.

Ms. Chelsea Leona L. Taguba, of the University of the Cordilleras Baguio City, was the next speaker who talked about "*Ungot ay Chinawat isnan Lafi: Ensup-oks and the Gift of Healing*." She explained that sup-ok is a traditional healing practice in Samoki, Bontoc, Mt. Province. The healing is done

Notes from a young entrepreneur

The author is a completer of BSU ATBI/IC's TBI Program. The following is the full text of his speech during the ATBI/IC recognition program on August 27, 2021.

Five years ago, I joined the program with a rather ambitious proposal to build a greenhouse with elevated plots applying hydroponics system in the middle of the strawberry farms. The idea itself was promising since it was adapted from farming technologies abroad.

However, to be able to apply it here in our setting proved to be rather challenging. It wasn't easy and it took a year before that blue greenhouse stood there. Now, five years later, maybe some of you are curious – was it worth it?

Back then I had two goals. First is to introduce and showcase other strawberry farming techniques and help uplift the strawberries of Benguet. Second, in all honesty, is of course to make money. In my mind, I thought I had it all figured out, like how much I could produce and earn. But my journey here would not have been as eventful and colorful without some challenges.

My first challenge I guess was promoting the "idea" itself. It was first met with raised eyebrows and skepticism. Is it necessary? Is it worth the big investment? With every doubt, I knew I had to prove more and I could only do that with good results.

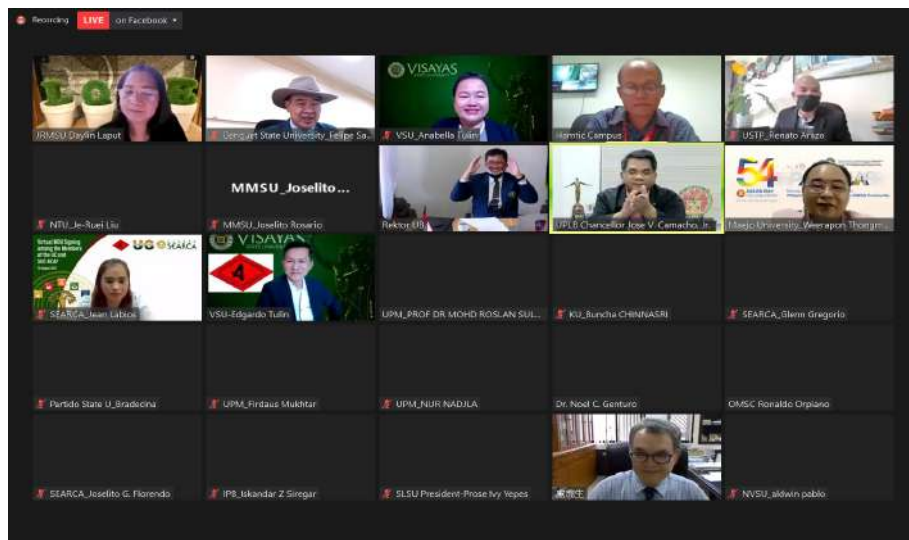
From the very start, I have known that putting up the greenhouse, building all

100 of the elevated plots, fabricating the customized planting beds and setting up the drip irrigation system was a huge task and that was only half of the job. We started in this area overgrown with noxious weeds and it took hours of painstaking manual labor before it was completed.

My biggest challenge was that I have never really grown strawberries before. It was actually my first time and my younger self thought he could learn it all from the books. I want to take this opportunity to thank all my co-incubatees, seniors and mentors, my ATBI family, for teaching me their ways and sharing their knowledge from years of personal experiences. I have learned a lot from each of you and I hope I have shared something with you too. I know I still have a lot more to learn. I have yet to perfect my strawberry production and there are still more and new varieties to try.

Then, there will always be unforeseen circumstances to

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President Comila attends MOU Signing for Institutional Cooperation



August 10, 2021- Dr. Edgardo E. Tulin represented the 74 members of the State Universities and Colleges-Association of Colleges of Agriculture in the Philippines (SUC-ACAP) when he signed the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) as the President of the organization.

The MOU was signed in line with the project on Leveling Up Philippine Higher Education Institutions in Agriculture, Fisheries, and Natural Resources (LevelUPHEI AFaR) funded by the Philippine Commission on Higher Education (CHED).

This project, managed by the Southeast Asian Regional Center for Graduate Study and Research in Agriculture (SEARCA), intends to build the leadership and research and development capacities of faculty/staff members from the 74 SUC-ACAP member universities and enhance their institutions' internationalization efforts by linking them with the Southeast Asian University Consortium for Graduate Education in Agriculture and Natural Resources (UC) through participation in training programs, summer schools, forums, cross-visits, and faculty and student mobilities in the UC member universities. //

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challenge us. Last 2018, Typhoon Ompong caused what we called "The Great Flood of La Trinidad." The floodwater was 5-6 ft high in the farms but luckily, the strawberries planted in the elevated plots survived. Our pipes were clogged and half of the roof was gone, but it was easier to replace the plastic than start from scratch. Then year 2020, the unthinkable happened – the world literally stopped and farmers were hit the hardest with this pandemic. With all the restrictions during the community quarantine, we lost our usual market – the tourists, so we had to look for other means. Whether the demand is high or low, farmers can not just abandon their farms but to go the extra mile. Now with the assistance of the government, cooperatives and private entrepreneurs, there are now many ways to market and promote our products online and in various trading centers. These are variables that we cannot control but must always overcome.

Here in ATBI, I learned the three important Is: Innovation, Investment, and Income. We all start with our ideas of innovation, then decide to invest in it, anticipating good income, just like a perfect mathematical equation. Ma'am Ruth always emphasized the importance of ROI (Return of Investment) and I agree 100% because in farming, we invest our time, money, and back-breaking labor. In my case, green house production requires a bigger initial investment than the conventional, however, you will have a more guaranteed and steady returns. It was not my intention to show-off but to show that investing in our structures and technologies will benefit us in the long run. There is no way for us farmers but to go forward, to innovate our techniques, to challenge ourselves constantly to do more and achieve more.

Lastly, I would like to thank BSU ATBI/IC for believing in me and trusting me five years ago, not knowing how it

vision and mission. This would be an opportunity but more of a challenge given to one to lead," said Dr. Comila.

Farming is indeed a continuous

learning process. I thought putting up the greenhouse was my endgame, but my experiences and training here in ATBI made me realize the vast potentials and opportunities to be explored. Let me conclude this with a quote from Brett Brian, a Canadian novelist, "Farming is a profession of hope." Five years, or even

ten years from now, I still am a farmer, but I certainly hope for greener fields, better market opportunities and improved farmer status.

Congratulations to all of us my fellow graduates and here's to hoping for good weather, good harvest, and good income! Thank you everyone and may God bless us all!

by the *ensup-ok* (healer or shaman) subtly blowing to transfer good or positive energy towards the *masup-okan* (patient). *Ensup-oks* also follow specific guidelines such as non-refusal of patients, no receiving of cash in exchange for the healing, and younger *ensup-oks* not overtaking senior *ensup-oks*. Ms. Taguba highlighted that becoming an *ensup-ok* is not for everyone in the community and should be a descendant of a previous *ensup-ok*. She elaborated that a person becomes an *ensup-ok* by dreaming of receiving an *ungot* (a dried coconut shell) from the *adi kaila* (the souls of the dead).

The next speaker, Ms. Imelda P. Bantas of the Baguio National High School, Baguio City, talked about "Innatang: A Surviving Wake Cultural Practice of the Indigenous Peoples

of Paykek, Kapangan." She defined *innatang*, a Kapangan Kankanaey term, as a voluntary communal help similar to the Tagalog practice *Bayanihan*. Ms. Bantas explained that conveniences afforded by modernity, division of labor (all tasks are assumed voluntarily by the people in the community), rationalization of *Innatang*, Christianization of wakes, and burials are the factors of change. "The psychological and socio-cultural significance of *Innatang* to the people of Paykek, where *Innatang* is a coping mechanism to the bereaved families, is that it reinforces a sense of community relations," she said.

Mr. Art B. Say-*eo* from the Mountain Province Polytechnic College Tadian Campus followed with a similar topic, "Binnadang Narratives: Wake Practices of Kayan Tadian". He discussed the geographic location and origin

of Kayan, the meaning of *Binnadang* as the spirit of community, solidarity, and cooperation, the socio-cultural and economic significance, and lastly, the gender roles related to the wake practices and beliefs of *Binnadang*. Mr. Say-*eo* ended his talk by emphasizing how *Binnadang* promotes a harmonious relationship and interaction in the community.

Ms. Rochelle Diver, the Environmental Health Coordinator of the International Indian Treaty Council Minneapolis in Minnesota, USA, did not attend and give her talk online due to inclement weather and connection issues. Nevertheless, her topic "Where Food Grows on Water: The Anishinabeg of North America" will be recorded and soon posted on the ISR Facebook page. //AKCariño
