Dr. Colting, in his talk acknowledged the support of the constituency. He said, "My family and I would like to thank you and the whole University for the unconditional support you have accorded to me during my incumbency as your president." He requested the constituency to extend the same support to Dr. Ladilad.

"I'm accepting this responsibility with commitment, dedication and transparency. I would like to reach out to you on matters that would lead to expansion, upgrading and excellence in various programs in instruction, research, extension and production or IGP," said Dr. Ladilad in his acceptance speech.

He added that he will continue to support the student first policy, strengthen human resource development programs and IGPs, fast track the full integration of the BSU Bokod and Buguias Campuses. "We shall also fast track the approval of the BSU Code because it will serve as a bible that will guide us in the years to come," he added.

Dr. Ladilad won the BSU presidency by seven votes during a BSU Board of Regents meeting held on December 5 at South Drive, Baguio City. This was attended by Private Sector Representatives Christine D. Abellon and Alumno Ampaguey, Mr. James Guanso representing Sen. Edgardo Angara, Atty. Cesar G. 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Benguet State University and Dr. Rogelio D. Colting

On July 1, 2003, Dr. Rogelio D. Colting's term as President of Benguet State University began. He set a tenpoint agenda for the University concerning academic programs and instruction, research and development, extension services and outreach, resource generation program, administration and governance, information communication technology, human resource development and personnel welfare, student services and welfare program, culture and arts program, disaster and emergency program and security.

In tribute to the former University President, here are some highlights of University milestones during his term.

His advocacy to organic agriculture has trailblazed major activities in the University such as the first Cordillera Organic Agriculture Congress on January 13-14, 2006 as one of the activities during the 20th Charter Day Celebration. The purpose of the congress was well captured in what a journalist wrote:

The gathering was not meant to be just another congress on organic agriculture. The participants and the speakers did not just hear each from other. Foremost, they wanted the Cordillera to shift from chemical-based agricultural production to organic farming to produce safe and competitive agricultural products for both local and international markets. Because of the support and acceptance for the promotion of organic farming, BSU intends to annually conduct a congress as a venue for organic farming enthusiasts and experts to share their experiences and expertise. 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BSU strawberry R&D program receives national CHED award

Using indigenous predatory mites against the two spotted spider mites that cause stunted growth and reduced yield on strawberries is one technology developed under the Strawberry R&D program of the Benguet State University. The indigenous mites reduced pesticide inputs by as much as 80%.

This contribution, among others, garnered the Strawberry R&D program the 3rd Place in the National Level at the recently concluded 2010 search for the Best Higher Education Research Program by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED).

The program, led by Dr. Danilo Padua also produced the first two promising strawberry varieties tentatively named Agsapa and BSU-Piere. Additional two varieties were later developed with

outstanding qualities.
Management of important
diseases of strawberry was also
discovered like broccoli rotation
and residue amendment, use of
organic mulches and indigenous
bio-control agents.

Under the program, new product lines of strawberry have been developed including those for high end market. Standardization of traditional strawberry processing technologies has also been done and disseminated to stake holders. Generation of baseline information on strawberry, consumer's attitude on price, quality and label provided concrete basis for producers.

The program harnessed the strawberry-based Agritourism project of La Trinidad as a venue to facilitate the gradual technology transfer from the program to the farmers. According to Dr. Padua, this will promote increased productivity with less importation of planting materials and pesticide inputs contributing to national development.

Dr. Leoncio M. Matibag, an accreditor for AACCUP or the Accrediting Agency for Chartered Colleges and Universities of the Philippines recommended University officials to source out funds for an overpass along the BSU stretch of the Halsema highway and drinking fountains in all buildings.

This was during the exit conference of the three-day AACCUP Accreditation conducted on December 5-7, 2011 for the degrees Doctor of Philosophy in Agronomy for Level I, BS in Library and Information Science and BS in Entrepreneurial Technology for preliminary surveys.

Albeit the recommendations, Dr. Matibag who was tasked to inspect Area VIII which is Physical Plant and Facilities appreciated the newly constructed University covered walk saying that it's the longest one he saw in all SUCs that he's been to.

"Your school is very accessible and clean with an atmosphere conducive to learning," he added.

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organizations in promoting organic agriculture in the Cordillera. Later on, the BSU Organic Agriculture Program (BSU-OAP) was ironed out. Dr. Colting, knowing very much how the newspapers can help in the new advocacy, in his R4D corner under the 'University Belt' column of Sun Star Baguio wrote on February 27, 2008;

The program's framework is premised on the Organic Certification Center of the Philippines (OCCP) definition on organic agriculture, which is: "the use of agricultural methods and practices that are considered to be ecologically sound and sustainable." Inspired by this mantra, the BSU-OAP aims to achieve the following: produce organically grown crops for consumers, generate technologies that promote long term productivity of farms, develop a market for organically grown crops and produce graduates who will support the organic agriculture industry.

In the following years, the Organic Market and the Cordillera Organic Agriculture Development

Center was launched. BSU produced coffee and some vegetables now boast of being certified by the Institute of Marketecology, an international organic agriculture certifying body and the Organic Certification Center of the Philippines.

Aside from this developments, organic agriculture as one specialization in the degree BS in Agriculture was also offered along with Master of Science in Agroecology with specialization in Organic Agriculture at the BSU-Open University in partnership with the

The six SUCs in the Cordillera will team up as a consortium to produce books on healthy Indigenous Knowledge about agriculture and environment conservation in CAR.

The books to be produced will be one output of the program "Documentation of Healthy Indigenous Knowledge on Agriculture and Environment Conservation in the Cordillera Administrative Region" that received a 2M start up fund from the office of Sen. Loren Legarda.

To jumpstart the program, an orientation and writeshop was conducted at the Benguet State University on December 12-13, 2011 participated by SUC heads namely Dr. Serafin Ngohayon of IfSU, Dr. Zacarias Baluscang of ASC, Dr. Eduardo T. Bagtang of KASC, Dr. Ben D. Ladilad of BSU and Dr. Louisa Valencia of ASIST.

The orientation and writeshop identified a focus area per SUC on IKs relative to climate change, an inventory and a common format on the identification and presentation of healthy IK on agriculture and environment conservation in CAR.

"For the indigenous peoples of the Cordillera region, it is their IK systems that set them apart from other communities in Philippine mainstream society. However, these are continuously being threatened not only by the influx of western or modern knowledge but more so by the fact that they are largely undocumented," reads the Program Proposal presented by IfSU President, Dr. Serafin Ngohayon.

The program has six projects including IK on Agriculture and Environment Conservation, IK on Health and Nutrition, IK on Local Governance, IK on Learning Systems, IK on Visual Arts and IK on Qualification and Quantification.//JST

In the context of sustainable development along Agriculture, Fisheries and Natural Resources, BSU continues to explore avenues where organic agriculture will see promotion.

Dr. Colting's other prime focus is the students first policy. Support to students' activities were given. The campus press was given full freedom to express the sentiments of the students, there was no censorship. In return students continued to perform well in TAYO, TOSP, AYALA Youth, Press Conferences and others.

Various partnerships with local, national and international institutions have been formed to provide an avenue for BSU to gain support for its extension services and outreach, students and constituency.

Some of these partners include the Asia Vegetable Research and Decveloment Center, Australian Center for Agricultural Research, Australian International Language Academy, Southern Cross International Learning Institute, Centro International De La Papa, In Went Organization, International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics, Soka University, Plastro Company, ARAVA International Center for Agricultural Training and many more. Locally, BSU partnered with CHED, CICT, Figaro Foundation, HARRDEC,

SUCs, NFA, media organizations, farmer's associations, LGUs, NGOs and private universities for projects ranging from technology commercialization to livelihood projects.

One example is the strawberry runner production trhough tissue culture. This provided local farmers with disease-free strawberry runners eventually earning it the Best HEI Extension Program award from CHED in 2010. BSU also served as a Nodal Center on ICT Development.

The Intellectual Property Rights Office was also established in 2003 to safeguard technologies developed in the University from piracy. Likewise, the formation of the University Public Affairs Office in 2005 contributed to increased number of visitors to the University promoting agro-tourism and improved the packaging of BSU-related information for prospect partners, clients and students. The International Language Center was launched to accommodate the increasing number of foreign students.

The University Library became the first library in North Luzon to fully automate library services adopting the Follet Library Integrated Software and in 2006. In 2007, BSU got the highest over-all Annual Performance

Rating (APR) among SUCs in CAR according to the Annual


Father Abner Dalilis officiated the Holy Mass during the blessing and inauguration of the Children and Lactation room at the
