

BSU submits six programs for Level IV validation

The Benguet State University (BSU) submitted six degree programs for validation by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP) during the hybrid accreditation survey visit on July 16-18, 2024.



A closing meeting for the hybrid accreditation survey visit was held on July 18, 2024 at the Rogelio Dulay Colting (RDC) Hall. This was attended by two AACCUP Accreditors, who came on-site, and the BSU Local Task Force.//OQAA

The programs validated were the Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Bachelor of Elementary Education, Bachelor of Early Childhood Education, Bachelor of Secondary Education, Bachelor of Technology and Livelihood Education, and Master of Science in Animal Science. The survey visit aimed to validate whether these programs sustained their current Level IV accreditation and to assess their compliance with the recommendations made during the last survey visit. They were assessed in the areas of research, performance of graduates, community service, international linkages and consortia, and the planning process.

During the opening program on July 16, 2024, Andres Arnold W. Lampacan, representing BSU President Felipe Salaing Comila, highlighted the significance of accreditation and the vital role of accreditors in improving and sustaining academic programs. He added that accreditation ensures that degree offerings remain relevant and responsive to the community's needs.

"You, our accreditors, are the gatekeepers of quality and ensure that our course offerings meet the highest standards and relevance. Your meticulous evaluation and constructive feedback

College Education Behind Bars Program, to begin first semester of SY 2024-2025

The College Education Behind Bars (CEBB) Program implemented in Benguet State University (BSU) through a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the University and the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology – Cordillera Administrative Region (BJMP-CAR) will take effect on the first semester of School Year 2024-2025.

This is after BJMP-CAR and BSU officials gathered at the RSDC Hall on July 26, 2024 to conclude the agreement initially signed on June 4, 2024.

BSU President Felipe Salaing Comila alongside BSU officials welcomed BJMP-CAR Jail Senior Superintendent Regional Director Kenneth Bid-ing; Provincial Jail Administrator–Benguet Bernard Marcos; Welfare and Development Section Chief Erlinda Las-egan; Baguio City Jail Male Dorm Warden April Rose Wandag-Ayangwa; Baguio City Jail Acting Female Dorm Warden Joan Bacayan; La Trinidad District Jail Acting Male Dorm Warden Pablo Las-egan; La Trinidad District Jail Acting Female Dorm Warden Euglenna Loquio, La Trinidad Municipal Jail Acting Warden Norman Palangyos, Buguias District Jail Acting Warden Noel Marcelo and their officers.

BSU VP for Academic Affairs, Samuel S. Poliden explained that the CEBB program will allow Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDLs) to acquire tertiary education through BSU where they will be recipients of the government's free higher education. The Office of Student Services (OSS) has already administered the BSU-College Admission Test for the potential students. would drive us to strive for excellence, innovate our teaching methods, and align our curricula with the evolving demands of our global landscape," Lampacan said.

This was followed by the introduction of BSU officials by Office for Quality Assurance and Accreditation (OQAA) Director Beverly C. Sa-ao and the introduction of the BSU Local Task Force by College of Nursing (CN) Dean Vicente G. Panagan Jr., College of Teacher Education (CTE) Dean Divina M. Yango, and College of Agriculture (CA) Dean Constantino T. Sudaypan, Sr. The AACCUP Team's Coordinator Divinagracia M. De Guzman of the Nueva Vizcaya State University also introduced the AACCUP accreditors and gave an orientation. De Guzman explained the reasons for accreditation endeavors and appreciated the University's interest in quality assurance, which demonstrates

BSU's strong desire to provide students the quality programs they need.

Along De Guzman, other accreditors were Sarah S. Taupan of Western Mindanao State University; Loida O. Crespo of Bulacan State University; Helen F. Bivian B. Cuh-ing, Principal of Benguet National High School and one of the training facilitators, highlighted the importance of this initiative. "This training is an opportunity for basic education teachers to deepen their understanding of the MATATAG curriculum to properly implement it," she said.

The five-day training program covered a comprehensive range of topics, including the General Shape of the MATATAG Curriculum and subject-specific content. Teachers also explored the integration of 21st-century skills into classroom-based assessments, the curriculum's Instructional Design Framework, effective pedagogies, and classroom observation techniques. Additionally, the program addressed collaborative expertise, the promotion of special needs education, and the management of school-based professional development programs.

Benguet Schools Division Superintendent, Sally B. Ullalim, emphasized the importance of ongoing collaboration among educators. "You must maintain this collaboration as teachers to discuss any concerns as you navigate the new curriculum. Let us strengthen this collaboration," she encouraged.

An inception meeting between Benguet State University (BSU) and Philippine Council for Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development (PCAARRD) for the project, "Enhancing the Productivity and Sustainability of Benguet Native Pig Production" was held at the Rogelio Dulay Colting (RDC) Hall on July 30, 2024. This was attended by BSU Project Leaders and personnel of the Livestock Research Division (LRD) of the DOST-PCAARRD. Possible issues and concerns were discussed to establish a solid foundation for the project implementation.



BSU President Felipe Salaing Comila expressed his gratitude to DOST-PCAARRD for partnering with the university and for their unwavering support. Constantino T. Sudaypan, Dean of the College of Agriculture, emphasized the college commitment to support researches that benefit the community. Likewise, Imelda B. Galinato of the BSU Accounting Office expressed her support for the project.

"We should go beyond publication, receiving awards out of research but extend the benefits of research to building sustainable livelihood, and for making significant contribution to the supply," said Synan S. Baguio, Director of the LRD-PCAARRD to encourage the researchers. Roscinto Ian C. Lumbres, BSU VP for Research and Extension, acknowledged the challenges faced by researchers but commended their dedication for finding solutions that address the community needs. He challenged the researchers to develop commercializable technology that would benefit the university. Lumbres also urged the administration to expedite the project's financial processes.

Josette San Luis from PCAARRD presented the DOST-Grants-In-Aid (GIA) guidelines, outlining the necessary data submissions, implementation procedures, monitoring, and other requirements for the project. Then, Mary Arnel D. Garcia, the project leader, also presented the project's goals, expected outputs, and budgetary requirements.

were also made. Students under the CEBB program will be included in the list of regular students but they will be given, special classes and modules.

"Thank you very much for this opportunity because you know... the reason for incarceration is poverty, and the contributory factor for poverty is lack of education. That is why the BJMP come up with this program...to help the PDLs who are also our kababayan, they are still part of the community," Bid-ing of BJMP-CAR said. He also assured that all these efforts will not go to waste.

VP for Administration and Finance, Allan C. Sacpa added that the program will cater to those who are still waiting for their verdict and those who are already convicted but not with hideous crimes. "Our PDLs deserve to be transformed," he said, adding that the program is one of the most meaningful ways in which the PDLs could be transformed.

BSU President Comila encouraged the VPs to see to the continuation of the program even after his term ends.

Benguet State University is the third state university in CAR to be providing educational growth to PDLs alongside Kalinga State University and Mountain Province State Polytechnic College. The CEBB program is pursuant to the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) #4 which is to ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong opportunities for all. Poliden shared that Davao del Norte State University was the first to implement the program and they recently held their second commencement exercises.//EBawang&JSTabangcura A learning session followed, where the participants discussed various aspects of the project, including budget allocation, pig selection, funding sources, facility requirements, procurement procedures, biosecurity measures, sample collection, and deliverables.

The meeting concluded with a message of gratitude from Ana B. Mendoza, the study leader, thanking PCAARRD for the funding and the administration for their support.

With the collaboration between DOST-PCAARRD and BSU, this project is set to contribute for the growth and development of the Benguet native pig industry.//BTayaban
