BSU hosts ISSAAS National Scientific Congress

Benguet State University (BSU) successfully hosted the Society for Southeast Asian Agricultural Sciences (ISSAAS) National Scientific Congress 2024 on September 11-13, 2024.

With the theme "Resilient and Sustainable Agriculture: Uniting Science, Technology, Innovation, and Policy," the event brought together researchers from various Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) and National Line Agencies (NLAs) across the Philippines.

The keynote speaker Department of Agriculture (DA) Secretary Francisco Tiu Laurel, Jr. was represented by Jennilyn M. Dawayan, Executive Regional Director of the DA-Cordillera Administrative Region.

In his message, Laurel emphasized that the ISSAAS conference provides a platform for stakeholders to exchange ideas, share knowledge, and build partnerships to shape the future of agriculture in the country. He highlighted the significance of the event to help reduce food insecurity and ensure food availability and affordability of safe and nutritious food.

Laurel also urged participants to focus on applying research and bridging the gap between research and practice. He emphasized the need to translate innovation into real-world applications to create a resilient agricultural sector in the country.

The congress featured a total of 90 research presentations covering a wide range of topics, organized into four plenary sessions: Cutting-Edge Science, Technology, and Innovation in Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources (AANR); Agroecology Strategies for Climate Resilience and Sustainable AANR; Post-Production Innovations, Nutrition, and Food Science; and Socioeconomics, Policy, and Culture.

Distinguished plenary speakers were Reynante L. Ordonio of the Philippine Rice Research Institute; Bernardo N. Sepeda of the National Research Council of the Philippines; Corazon L. Abansi of the University of the Philippines Baguio; Amparo M. Wagan of the UP Los Baños; and Junel B. Soriano of the Department of Agriculture Bureau of Agricultural Research.

On the last day of the congress, participants explored the Northern Blossom in Atok, the Living Gifts in Bahong, La Trinidad, and the Benguet Agri-Pinoy Trading Center (BAPTC) in La Trinidad, Benguet.

BSU VP for Research and Extension and Co-Chair of the 2024 ISSAAS National Scientific Congress, Roscinto Ian C. Lumbres said that among the significant benefits of the event was the generation of interest from external agencies in collaborating with BSU such as the Philippine Rice Research Institute (PhilRice), the University of the Philippines Los Baños (UPLB), the Department of Science and Technology (DOST), and other State Universities and Colleges (SUCs). He also said that the plenary speakers were impressed with the different papers presented by the BSU researchers.

To ensure that academic programs are in compliance with the minimum requirements set by the Commission of Higher Education (CHED), Benguet State University (BSU) submitted three graduate degree programs for evaluation by the CHED Technical Evaluator and Technical Committee Team on September 19, 2024 at the RDC Hall. The evaluation process was also intended to determine the programs' eligibility for the issuance of Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) by CHED.

The CHED Evaluation Team was composed of Roselle Jardin, Jose Neil Hortillo, Ronald Pastrana, Lucita B. Mejia, Menzie O. Kuengan, and Godfrey Mendoza. The team assessed the Master in Public Administration (MPA) program offered by the College of Public Administration and Governance (CPAG) and the Master in Human Resource Management (MHRM) and

Three BSU degree programs revisited by AACCUP



The Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP) reassessed the undergraduate degree programs offered at the Benguet State University (BSU) Buguias and La Trinidad during the Online Accreditation Survey Visit held on September 24-26, 2024.

The evaluated programs were the Bachelor of Elementary Education (BEEd) and Bachelor of Secondary Education (BSEd) at the BSU Buguias for Level II and the Bachelor of Library and Information Science (BLIS) of the BSU La Trinidad for Level III Phase II. The accreditation involved reevaluation of these programs under the areas of Extension and Laboratories for BEE and BSE while the area of Extension for BLIS.

The AACCUP Accreditation Team was composed of Benhur A. Asid of the Western Mindanao State University (WMSU), Benjamin B. Mangila of the J.H. Cerilles State College (JHCSC), and Razil M. Gumanoy of the North Eastern Mindanao State University (NEMSU). They looked into the program documents and conducted a virtual tour of the facilities.

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Eduardo V. Abastilla were also recognized in the program. They responded by sharing their experiences and insights as former private sector representatives of the BOR.

In a show of commitment to public service, BSU employees led by Chief Administrative Officer Matias C. Angiwan Jr. recited the *Panunumpa ng Kawani ng Gobyerno.*

BSU was established as a farm school in 1916. It gradually expanded its offerings and became a national agricultural school. Over the years, it underwent several name changes and was eventually converted into a state university in 1986.// BSU President Felipe Salaing Comila and VP for Academic Affairs Samuel S. Poliden expressed their gratitude to the accreditors for the opportunity to evaluate the three undergraduate programs. They assured the accreditors that BSU would remain steadfast in its commitment to upholding high educational standards for its students.

Comila highlighted the crucial role of accreditors in ensuring the success of BSU's academic programs. He urged the BSU Local Task Force to continue working diligently to enhance the curriculum to benefit the students and the community.

At the closing meeting on September 26, 2024, the accreditors gave their impressions on the accredited programs. They shared the programs' strengths and development observed during the evaluation process, highlighting the BSU's extension projects and initiatives to serve the local communities and the wellequipped laboratories to facilitate students in their learning activities.

Afterwards, Poliden representing Comila delivered his words of commitment and gratitude, assuring that the accreditors' comments will be considered for improvement of the programs.

"Your feedback serves as an eyeopener for us as we strive for excellence in our programs, not just for the BEEd and BSEd but in all the programs we are offering in the campus," said Lemar A. Ablaza, Associate Executive Dean of the BSU Buguias in his closing remarks.//EBawayan

BSU graduates excel in Librarian Licensure Exam

A total of 28 Benguet State University (BSU) graduates have passed the Librarians Computer-Based Licensure Examinations conducted on September 11-12, 2024 in Rosales, Pangasinan and Manila by the Philippine Regulation Commission.

All successful examinees are first-time takers listing a BSU passing rate of 75.68%. The University surpassed the national passing rate of 48.77%.

College of Information Sciences (CIS) Dean Russell B. Dolendo expressed her delight in the university's continued success in the said licensure exam.

"I am happy that BSU surpassed the national passing rate of the licensure examination and ever since we have consistently surpassed the national passing rate," she said. She commended the BSU graduates for their resiliency and perseverance in overcoming challenges during their studies and preparation for the examination. She added that despite challenges like the impact of pandemic restrictions on both online and face-toface classes, remote testing centers, and the unexpected switch to a computerbased licensure exam, the BSU graduates performed outstandingly on the board exam.

Dolendo and Chairperson of the Department of Library and Information Science Elizabeth A. Lascano shared the department's best practices that contributed to the high passing rate. These practices included curriculum enhancement to incorporate computer-based skills, conducting review sessions, and inviting experts in library science as resource speakers. It included also their support and motivation for their students from admission to graduation and throughout their preparation for the licensure exam. To further improve the future University's performance in the librarian licensure exam, they shared the college plans to conduct pre-examination seminars to enhance their preparation for the board exam. Additionally, they also encourage those who did not pass to participate in review sessions to improve their chances in future attempts.

Lascano also shared that they motivate their students by emphasizing the importance of taking the licensure exam promptly after graduation, while the knowledge gained is still fresh. She further said that they urge the students to take the board exam highlighting the greater chances of employability for librarians due to the limited number of professionals in the field.

"We thank the administration for continually recognizing and supporting the Bachelor of Library and Information Science program. We were able to maintain the program and in terms of licensure examination, we appreciate the support of the administration especially to the board exam passers," expressed Dolendo.//EBawayan

Since 2018, BSU and UoG have maintained a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to collaborate on issues related to Indigenous health, gender, history, and culture.

They were also introduced to the University's "Sharing Island Wisdom" program, specifically the project on Reviving Traditional Navigation project.

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Throughout the evaluation process, the team reviewed the program documents under the areas of board resolutions on the offering of the programs; accreditation status; program description, outcomes, goals, and objectives; profile of the dean and program coordinator; faculty profile; curriculum; **Outcomes-Based** Education (OBE) requirement; library resources; laboratory and facilities; admission and retention policy, adviser to student ration, and thesis/ dissertation panel; research and creative works; and Higher Education Institution (HEI)-Industry partnership. It also involved validation of the evidence and interviews with the key persons involved.

During the closing meeting, the evaluators shared their findings on the evaluated programs, highlighting the strengths of the three programs and areas of improvement. They also commended the BSU Local Task Force for their cooperation throughout the evaluation period. Likewise, Comila delivered his words of commitment and gratitude to the evaluators. He then expressed support to the colleges and urged them to continue working together towards quality programs and services.

The evaluation process is also an essential step for the MPA, MHRM, and MCM's accreditation by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP).//EBawayan

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to collaborate with BSU and hopefully that would result in research funding from other agencies. We learned a lot, especially from our researchers. We were able to learn what research activities are being conducted by other institutions, and we would like to explore a partnership with them," Lumbres said. He added that as the host of the national congress, BSU could potentially collaborate with other SUCs on future national and international conferences.

Lumbres also looked forward to the commercialization of the researches presented during the congress to benefit the broader community.

"We hope the BSU researches presented will be commercialized. This commercialization aligns with BSU President Felipe Salaing Comila's advocacy on entrepreneurship.
